Yet the "project" started way before Trapper or we had an inkling what was to come. (Psalm 51:10) Only with that foundation are we ready and able to receive and hear God's many calls. "The heart allows us to respond with plans and action, but the Lord establishes the steps." Sr. Therese Dush, C.A., our foundress, envisioned and built a community that comes together to serve the unmet needs of our neighbors in Clearfield County and beyond. Deep faith connections through Zoom

Many faces, many zoom sessions, and an abundance of grace! Since going to the Zoom platform for youth retreats, Sr. Suzanne Thibault, C.A., has led over 500 students with their sponsors to explore many aspects of their faith together. We've connected with 22 parishes from 2 separate diocese!

Grandparents have been in conversation with their grandchildren. Parents and their teenagers have been communicating on a deeper level about what the Catholic faith means to them. One mother called to thank Suzanne for creating the space to reconnect with her daughter. Sr. Suzanne received a picture on her phone of a grandfather and grandson working together, with a message from a mom saying, "I am so happy my dad and son are bonding on the level of faith." One young man reflected on the concept of being "in communion" with other members of the church: "It made me realize everyone there could relate to one another." He experienced this during the breakout room discussions.

We are extremely grateful for God's continued grace and inspiration that more than 1000 people (students and their sponsors) in our church have a deeper awareness of God and His grace active in their lives!

The joy and hope of Christmas has lasted far longer than December 25

This greeting card verse inspires me to pray for the many, many, people God has put in our lives here at YPWC. For those who assisted in our Christmas program, you are that one life that made all the difference in the lives of 78 families – 287 people in all.

On Christmas morning 16 families had new vacuum cleaners. One mom called to say thank you and told me, "That vacuum made my Christmas!" Two families have repaired vehicles and now have a secure way to get to work and run errands. 6 families (28 people) now are eating meals at a table instead of on the floor or on a couch. Sarah (name changed) called YPWC imploring, "Please don't buy me anything for Christmas. What I really want is warm, safe clothing and boots for my husband, who is a welder." A mishap at work destroyed his fire-resistant outdoor work gear and he was going to work in just a light jacket and sneakers. Your generous financial donations made it possible to outfit him in work boots and what was needed to keep him safe, warm and still working.

I could keep going with more stories, yet what I really want to say to you is that the joy and hope of Christmas has lasted far longer than December 25.

How can all this be measured in our eyes? It can't, but with God one life can make all the difference. Thank you to each and every one of our donors and volunteers who make our Christmas program possible. May God continue to inspire you toward acts of service, kindness and love.

Loving your neighbor as yourself means acting with compassion. When Jesus was asked, "Who is my neighbor?" He responded with the story of the Good Samaritan. Who did Jesus say was being a neighbor? The one who had compassion.

Compassion is not simply a warm fuzzy feeling in our hearts. Compassion is a call to action. A heart that is moved by compassion cannot sit idly by while someone suffers a need. Loving your neighbor as yourself is being moved to help your neighbor in so far as you are able.

Dan who has helped with many Direct Service projects jumped in and installed the new railing.

leading up to her door.



Fr. Phil Billotte continues to live out his call to the priesthood over these past twelve years at Bethany Retreat Center. He was ordained to the priesthood June 4th 1966 by Bishop James E. Kearney in service to the Rochester Diocese in New York. He

served as Associate Pastor and Pastor for many different parishes over his years as a diocesan priest. Taking an early retirement after a heart attack he moved back to his parents' homestead. How providential that Fr. Phil's boyhood home was located right next door to YPWC mission.



It was a natural evolution that he became a part of the community and retreat work

at Bethany and YPWC. In addition to serving sacramental needs and celebrating liturgy he has filled in for area priests and, for the last 10 years, volunteered at the Moshannon Valley Correctional Center, serving the incarcerated where he was honored as the 2019 Volunteer of the Year. One of the opportunities Fr. Phil has enjoyed most over all these years has been teaching and being an influence for young people while serving at Bethany.

Often Fr. Phil challenges us in his homilies at Mass with the words, "Are You Ready? Are you ready to live out your call by living out the gospel and following our Lord Jesus?" One of his favorite scripture passages is, "Whatever you do to the least of your brothers and sisters you have done to me." (Matthew 25:40) It has been his guidepost for his entire priesthood. Thank you Fr. Phil for being our pastor and for being a priest forever.


Life Line Clearfield, 35-Year Ministry of Presence

Facing an unplanned pregnancy can be a frightening and lonely prospect. Since 1986 Life Line Clearfield has been providing much needed childbirth education, parenting support, nutrition counseling, clothing, car seats, pack and plays, baby formula and emotional support to pregnant women, mothers, and young families with nowhere else to turn. Lisa (name changed), a 23-year-old mother of four, has been a Life Line client since 2015. Facing many struggles, she has turned to Angela Larson and Ronda Stiles at Life Line Clearfield for the support and supplies she has needed to move toward independence and self-reliance. With no spouse to help she has done her best to provide a loving home to her young children with a goal of independent living. Life Line has been there for her on many occasions providing formula, needed baby items and guidance. She recently received approval through housing assistance to seek a house (to move out of public housing) and most recently landed a job which brings her closer to her goal of independent living. Her perseverance is paying off!
